

11. INTEGRITY:

An attached garage was added ca. 1960. A rear patio was added in the 1960s, and screened-in during the 1970s.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

This house is located at the corner of Crest Lane and Warren Road, at the crest of the hill. The houses on this part of Crest Lane were all built at about the same time, and are similar in scale and setback. This particular house is oriented diagonally on the lot, so as to allow the living room to face southwest, overlooking Fall Creek and Forest Home Drive.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

This single story, gable-roofed house is set on a sloping lot which allows rear, ground-level access to the full basement. Originally rectangular in shape, this house has a recessed front porch, and has seen the addition of a front garage wing, and a rear screened patio.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Once a part of the Warren farm, Crest Lane was subdivided by Mary Warren in 1948 when she decided to retire from farming. This was the second major subdivision of Warren farm land for residential purposes, Halcyon Hill having been the first, some 40 years earlier. Mrs. Warren hired local builder William McElwee, Sr. to construct this corner house for her at the entrance to Crest Lane. It was the last house that Mr. McElwee built. In 1949, Mrs. Warren moved into her new home, and sold the old Warren farmhouse, barns, and remaining acreage to her daughter and son-in-law, Martha and John Hertel, who, at that time, were living on McIntyre Place in Forest Home. This house at 103 Crest Lane is now owned by another daughter and son-in-law, Mary and John Swan. Mr. Swan is Professor Emeritus of Extension Administration at Cornell.
